Something Special out of History...

A tribute, memorial, to our veterans who were killed in the Vietnam War hangs in the National Veteran's Art Museum in Chicago, IL. A rare memorial, Thanks to our Vets!

When visitors first enter the museum, they will hear a sound like wind chimes coming from above them and their attention will be drawn upward 24 feet to the ceiling of the two-story high atrium.

Dog tags of the more than 58,000 service men and women who died in the Vietnam War hang from the ceiling of the National Vietnam Veterans Art Museum in Chicago on Veterans Day, November 11, 2010. The 10-by-40-foot sculpture, entitled Above and Beyond, was designed by Ned Broderick and Richard Stein.

The tens of thousands of metal dog tags are suspended 24 feet in the air, 1 inch apart, from fine lines that allow them to move and chime with shifting air currents. Museum employees using a kiosk and laser pointer help visitors locate the exact dog tag with the imprinted name of their lost friend or relative.





Did you know.... Rudolph the Red Nosed Reindeer ?

The story of Rudolph The Red-Nosed Reindeer was written in 1939 by Robert L. May, a copywriter for the Chicago-based Montgomery Ward department stores, as a promotional gift for the store's customers. The stores had bought and distributed coloring books every Christmas and saw writing their own story as a way to

save money. Montgomery Ward distributed 2.4 million copies of the Rudolph booklet in 1939. A total of 6 million copies had been given out by the end of 1946, even though wartime paper shortages restricted printing.

The story reflects May's own childhood difficulties as the smallest boy in his class. He was taunted for being a frail, scrawny misfit.

The reindeer was almost named Rollo or Reginald. May considered both these named before settling on Rudolph.

Rudolph's story was made into a song when May's brother-in-law, songwriter Johnny Marks, developed the lyrics and melody for it. Marks' musical version was first recorded by Gene Autry in 1949, selling 2 million copies that year.

Autry didn't want anything to do with this song. It was his wife who talked him into recording it, and it went on to become the second biggest-selling Christmas song of all time, next to Bing Crosby's "White Christmas." (thanks, Jeff - Boston, MA)

A little footnote to this story is that Gene had 3 songs he wanted to record on the old "45's" some of us listened to. He needed a 4th song and that's when his wife convinced him to record this song. Due to recording time and scheduling he only had the time left to record this song just once and it was a hit!... Perhaps a true "ONE HIT WONDER" and the one song he recorded that day which went down in history.

Autry was known as "The Singing Cowboy." He teamed up with Roy Rogers in the 1930's and 40's to make movies in a new genré called "Musical Westerns." Autry had his own TV show in the 1950's and was the owner of the California Angels baseball team, now known as the Anaheim Angels. Autry, who died in 1998, is the only person with 5 stars on the Hollywood Walk of Fame, which he earned for motion pictures, radio, music recording, television, and live theater.

This song was the basis for a children's TV Special made in 1964. It was narrated by Burl Ives, and became a Christmas classic. The Chipmunks did a version of this that was a hit in 1960.

December Historical & Current Events

December 2nd

The first successful artificial heart transplant was completed at the University of Utah Medical Center. The recipient was Barney C. Clark, age 61, 1982

December 3rd

The first American flag was raised aboard the "USS Alfred," 1775

The treason trial of Jefferson Davis, president of the Confederacy, began in Richmond, Virginia. Before Circuit Court Judges Salmon P. Chase and John C. Underwood. The charges were dropped on February 15, 1869 after President Andrew Johnson's amnesty proclamation, 1868

"Camelot" opened on Broadway, 1960

December 4th

General Washington bade farewell to his troops, 1783

December 5th National Prohibition ended, 1933

December 6th

Construction of Washington Monument was completed, 1884

The first broadcast of an official presidential address occurred when President Calvin Coolidge gave his second annual address to Congress. The transmission was so clear that technicians in St. Louis, Missouri telephoned Washington, D.C., to ask about the occasional rustling noise, which turned out to be caused by the president turning the pages of his address, 1923

December 7th

Japanese warplanes attacked United States at Pearl Harbor, Hawaii, 1941

December 8th

United States entered World War II, 1941

A treaty was enacted which prohibited nuclear weapons in space, 1966

December 11th

Incandescent stage lighting was first used in the U.S. at the Bijou Theater in Boston at a performance of *Iolanthe*, by Gilbert and Sullivan, 1883

December 12th

Joseph Rainey became the first black in the House of Representatives, 1870

December 15th

The Bill of Rights went into effect, 1791

December 16th

The first patent for a process of shaping brass into bowls was issued to Hiram Hayden of Waterbury, Connecticut. Dishes of brass, fastened to spinning dies, were pressed to the shape of the die, 1852

December 18th

The first celestial photograph was taken, 1839

December 21st

A bill authorizing a federal bailout for Chrysler Corporation by providing \$1,500,000,000 in federal loan guarantees was passed by Congress, 1980. (Signed into law on January 7, 1980 by President James Carter).

December 23rd

"A Visit From St. Nicholas" (The Night Before Christmas) by Clement C. Moore, was published in New York, 1823

December 25th

The first recorded Christmas was celebrated in Rome, A.D. 336

"Silent Night" was performed for the first time at the Church of St. Nikolaus, Oberndorff, Austria, 1818
